In a July 2009 - Edward Deezen (born March 6, 1957) is an American actor and comedian, best known for his roles as "nerd" characters in films including Grease, Grease 2, Midnight Madness, I Wanna Hold Your Hand, 1941, Million Dollar Mystery and WarGames. He has had larger starring roles in independent films such as Surf II, Mob Boss, Beverly Hills Vamp, and Teenage Exorcist.

Deezen is also a prolific voice actor, whose more notable characters include Mandark in the Cartoon Network series Dexter's Laboratory, Snipes the Magpie in Rock-a-Doodle, Ned in Kim Possible, and the Know-It-All Kid in The Polar Express.

The show has 15 seasons in total.

Several changes were made for the second - The Muppet Show is a live-action/puppet television series that was created by Jim Henson and produced by ITC Entertainment and Henson Associates. It premiered on 5 September 1976 and ended on 23 May 1981, with a total of 120 episodes over the course of 5 seasons.

The rights to the series are currently owned by The Muppets Studio (a division of The Walt Disney Company), having been acquired from The Jim Henson Company in February 2004.

The 120 episodes were produced in the UK between 1976 and 1980; two pilot episodes were also produced, one in 1974 and the other in 1975. The UK broadcasts featured extra scenes that were not seen on US TV. There is no set broadcast order for the episodes, as they were shown in varying order in different regions. For the Season One DVD box set that was released in 2005, Buena Vista Home Entertainment placed the episodes in the order in which they were produced, rather than aired, for this reason. Due to the sequence in which the episodes are organized on DVD disc 1, Scooter is part of the backstage staff before his first appearance (Jim Nabors episode). The set also includes the longer UK versions of each of the episodes, though six song sequences were cut from the set because of licensing issues. It is common for television executives to insist on an edit of video release rather than pay money to the owners of the copyright of songs. Examples include the Vincent Price episode, the closing number of which, "You've Got a Friend", is cut on The Muppet Show: Season One DVD; it is available uncut and in English on the German DVD.

The tables below list episodes based on their initial airing dates, for the United Kingdom, except for the two pilots. Thus they may not necessarily be the order in which episodes were shown in all regions.

The Muppet Show was released for streaming on Disney+ on 19 February 2021. However, two episodes featuring guests Brooke Shields and Chris Langham are omitted from the streaming service, the former due to music licensing issues, and the latter possibly due to the actor's child pornography arrest. In several European countries, the episode featuring John Denver is omitted as well.

Together, they help the alien escape from the Secret Service agents who are pursuing him so that he can return to his home planet. The film is a parody of other science-fiction films, especially those of Steven Spielberg, as well as of science fiction fandom in general.

Paul is a British-French-American venture produced by Universal Pictures, Working Title Films, StudioCanal, Big Talk Pictures and Relativity Media and distributed by Universal Pictures. It was released on 14 February 2011 in the United Kingdom and on 18 March 2011 in the United States to generally positive reviews from critics and grossed \$98 million worldwide on a \$40 million budget.

Bea Nilsson

No. 16 - Bea Nilsson is a fictional character from the Australian television soap opera Neighbours, played by singer-songwriter Bonnie Anderson. Anderson had auditioned for the serial numerous times, and after impressing producers, they created the role of Beatrix "Bea" Nilsson just for her. She was given a two-year contract and she began filming in February 2018. Bea marks Anderson's first major acting role and she called it "the best thing" that had ever happened to her. She made her first appearance during the episode broadcast on 18 May 2018. The character was introduced as the estranged half-sister of Elly Conway (Jodi Anasta) and niece of Susan Kennedy (Jackie Woodburne).

Bea is characterised as fierce, strong, and independent. She keeps her guard up and hides behind a "tough exterior". However, she is loyal and willing to do anything to protect her loved ones. Anderson liked that her

character had "rough edges", but thought there was also an innocence about her. She was also surprised by the positive response to Bea's early scenes as the character was "quite bitchy". It emerges through her early scenes that Bea fought with Elly and then spent five years living on the streets. Anderson hoped that the sisters would be able to rebuild their relationship. Her singing career was later incorporated into the show, as Bea is shown to be a singer-songwriter. Anderson released her track "Sorry" via Bea's storyline.

The character's introduction and early storylines were intertwined with the return of villain Finn Kelly (Rob Mills), who manipulates and uses her to gain revenge on those he feels have wronged him, including Elly and Susan. Anderson felt sorry for her character because she had loved Finn. Bea and Elly's relationship remains strained in the aftermath, which allows their mother Liz Conway (Debra Lawrance), whom Anderson branded selfish, to play them off against one another. Liz's introduction also helps explore Bea's fictional backstory further, as it emerges that Liz wanted Bea to leave home because she reminded Liz too much of her father.

Bea's romantic relationships have been central to her storylines. Writers paired Bea with her second love interest Ned Willis (Ben Hall) in August 2018. He and Bea form a close bond during a series of night time walks and Anderson thought that he made Bea feel safe. Ned and Bea's relationship is badly affected by Finn's return to Ramsay Street, as Ned becomes controlling and possessive of Bea. He deliberately fails to stop a chemical attack in which Bea is poisoned, so that Finn will get the blame. Anderson found the chemical attack scenes to be some of the hardest she had to film. She also agreed with Bea and Ned's subsequent break-up. A romantic relationship is soon re-established between Bea and Finn, who is suffering from amnesia as a result of a fall. Anderson believed that Bea initially feel sadness for Finn, before the "spark" between them returns. During the show's 35th anniversary week, Finn regains his memories and attempts to kill Bea by pushing her into a mineshaft, so he can be with Elly.

The character has a short-lived relationship with Levi Canning (Richie Morris). The pair develop a strong friendship, however, before they can act on their growing feelings, Bea becomes the centre of a love triangle as she begins dating guest character Nathan Packard (Jackson Gallagher). It soon emerges that Nathan was part of a gang who attacked Levi when he was younger and he and Bea eventually part ways. Anderson enjoyed working with Morris and Gallagher on the storyline, and reiterated that Levi was the man for Bea. The pair become a couple during the serial's Christmas episodes. As part of a storyline exploring the danger of picking wild mushrooms, Bea is poisoned after she consumes toxic mushrooms in a pie made by Roxy Willis (Zima Anderson) and Kyle Canning (Chris Milligan). Bea chooses to keep their involvement a secret, which leaves Levi feeling betrayed when he learns the truth. It also exposes a lack of communication between him and Bea. Further issues between them, including Levi getting Bea fired from her job, lead to their break-up.

Anderson decided to leave Neighbours in early 2021 in order to concentrate on her music career and pursue other acting roles. She wanted a dramatic exit, but instead Bea leaves Erinsborough for a road trip around Australia after breaking up with Levi. Anderson filmed her exit scenes on 4 March 2021 and they were broadcast on 24 May 2021. When Neighbours was cancelled in 2022, Anderson reprised the role for its then-finale and for a couple of episodes following its revival. Her final appearance aired on 14 November 2023. The character and Anderson's performance were well received by critics. In 2019, Anderson received a nomination for the Logie Award for Most Popular New Talent. Digital Spy's Conor McMullan observed that Bea's arrival had "really livened up the lives of the Kennedy-Conways", while Sarah Ellis of Inside Soap thought Anderson had done well making the change from singing to acting.

Waterloo Road series 11

What's on TV. - The eleventh series of the British television series Waterloo Road originally aired on BBC One in the United Kingdom between 3 January and 14 February 2023. This series marks the first series of Waterloo Road since the show was cancelled after the tenth series in 2015. The series follows the staff and pupils of the fictional Waterloo Road High School in Greater Manchester. Co-produced by Wall to Wall and Rope Ladder Fiction, the series was executively produced by Cameron Roach, Gaynor Holmes and Jo McClellan. The revival was announced in September 2021. The decision to revive the drama was inspired by the high viewership figures of the original series after it was made a box set on the BBC iPlayer.

Approximately 130 people worked on the series: 50 cast members and 80 members of the production team. Four actors reprise their roles from the original series, bridging the two iterations of the drama. A six-month production development training scheme was created to support entry into television production, with 20 trainees produced as a result. Seven hour-long episodes were commissioned for the series. It was promoted through trailers, promotional images and a red carpet premiere held in Stockport. In addition to weekly broadcast, the series was released as a box set on BBC iPlayer. A podcast, consisting of nine episodes, was also launched.

The series explores a range of topical issues facing schools, pupils and parents in Britain following the COVID-19 pandemic. These issues were deemed perfect for exploration through Waterloo Road. The series also established opportunity to provide visibility for underrepresented groups. Multiple stories were explored in each episode of the series. The death of Chlo Charles (Katie Griffiths), a surprise twist in the opening episode, serves as a catalyst for several stories in the series. In addition to the school-centric plots, writers also explored attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD), the cost of living crisis in the UK, bulimia nervosa, amongst other stories.

The show's revival attracted a mixed response upon its announcement. Many praised the decision and thought it would be a good platform for young talent, however Jim Waterson of The Guardian did not believe it justified the axing of Holby City. Charlotte Moore, the chief content officer at BBC, defended the revival against criticism and felt it was "reimagined for the modern day". Whilst the show attracted poor overnight ratings, it was reportedly popular with a younger audience on BBC iPlayer. Like the announcement, the actual series received a mixed reception from television critics and viewers alike. In particular, Chlo's death was heavily criticised with Hannah Van De Peer of The Tab deeming the choice "random". Contrastingly, Kelly Jo's ADHD story was highly praised by critics and special needs organisations; Eleanor Noyce from the Radio Times called Kelly Jo's ADHD story "a particular standout" of the revival.

Jeremy Clarkson

Campbell on Top Gear, saying "I don't believe what I write, any more than you [Campbell] believe what you say". Clarkson has been described as a "skillful - Jeremy Charles Robert Clarkson (born 11 April 1960) is an English television presenter, journalist, farmer, and author who specialises in motoring. He is best known for hosting the motoring television programmes Top Gear (2002–2015) and The Grand Tour (2016–2024) alongside Richard Hammond and James May. He also currently writes weekly columns for The Sunday Times and The Sun. Clarkson hosts the ITV game show Who Wants to Be a Millionaire? (2018–present), and stars in the farming documentary show Clarkson's Farm (2021–present).

From a career as a local journalist in northern England, Clarkson rose to public prominence as a presenter of the original format of Top Gear in 1988. Since the mid-1990s, he has become a recognised public personality, regularly appearing on British television presenting his own shows for the BBC and appearing as a guest on other shows. As well as motoring, Clarkson has produced programmes on subjects such as history

and engineering; he has also written numerous books, primarily on cars. In 1998, he hosted the first series of Robot Wars. From 1998 to 2000, he also hosted his own talk show, entitled Clarkson.

In 2015, the BBC elected not to renew Clarkson's contract after he assaulted a Top Gear producer while filming on location. That year, Clarkson and his Top Gear co-presenters and producer Andy Wilman formed the production company W. Chump & Sons to produce The Grand Tour for Amazon Prime Video.

Clarkson's opinionated but humorous tongue-in-cheek writing and presenting style has often provoked a public reaction. His actions, both privately and as a Top Gear presenter, have also sometimes resulted in criticism from the media, politicians, pressure groups, and the public. He also has a significant public following, being credited as a major factor in the resurgence of Top Gear as one of the most popular shows on the BBC. In 2006, the British public ranked him number 19 in ITV's poll of TV's 50 Greatest Stars.

Since 2019, he has become a farmer at Diddly Squat Farm for his show, Clarkson's Farm. The show received a positive reception and became a popular show on Prime Video upon its release. In May 2024, the "Clarkson's clause" amendment, named after Clarkson, was introduced; this clause makes it easier to convert unused agricultural buildings to commercial usage, something he did in Season 2 of the show when planning permission for his restaurant was denied.

The End of the F***ing World

her. They embark on a road trip across England and begin to develop a relationship after a series of mishaps. Alex Lawther as James, a disturbed 17-year-old - The End of the F***ing World is a British black comedy television programme. Based on the 2011–13 minicomics The End of the Fucking World by Charles Forsman, the eight-part first series premiered its first episode on Channel 4 in the United Kingdom on 24 October 2017, after which the following episodes were released on All 4. Netflix handled international distribution and released it internationally on 5 January 2018. The programme follows James (Alex Lawther), a 17-year-old who believes himself to be a psychopath, and Alyssa Foley (Jessica Barden), an angry classmate who sees in James a chance to escape from her tumultuous home life. Gemma Whelan, Wunmi Mosaku, Steve Oram, Christine Bottomley, Navin Chowdhry, Barry Ward and Naomi Ackie appear in supporting roles.

Series creator Jonathan Entwistle contacted Forsman about making a film, and a short one was made in 2014. The short film is now considered to be lost, with no way to access the film online. Instead, an eight-part serial was commissioned, with filming beginning in April 2017. It was written by Charlie Covell, and episodes were directed by Entwistle and Lucy Tcherniak. In August 2018, the programme was renewed for a second series, which premiered on Channel 4 on 4 November 2019, after which all eight episodes were released on All 4, and internationally on Netflix the next day. Covell stated before the second series's release that they do not intend to produce a third series for the programme.

The programme has been praised for its writing, execution and subject matter, as well as for Lawther's and Barden's performances. Both the series were nominated for the British Academy Television Award for Best Drama Series, with the second series winning in 2020, as well as receiving a Peabody Award in 2019.

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
